# Case Study: The Eye in the Sky

A professor begins to show his students the award winning movie “The Eye in the Sky,” a movie about military ethics and the use of drones, when one of the students stands up and leaves the classroom. The student returns for the next class, and explains: “I had to leave the class because you were showing an “R” rated movie. I am only sixteen and I’m not allowed to see “R” movies!” (Rated “R” movies are restricted; if you are under 17, you must be accompanied by a parent or adult guardian).

The Professor now has a problem. The movie is a detailed case study about the issue of collateral damage in the military’s use of armed drones, and the case is central to the final exam. Should the professor change the course, specifically the final exam, to accommodate the young student?

# Case Study: Real-to-Life Examples of Complex Ethical Dilemmas

Should the professor maintain that the student has to watch the movie or fail this “in class” assignment?

- Questions:

- 1) What values are you weighing as you evaluate this situation?
- 2) What issues are at play in this decision?
- 3) Have you considered the perspective of the various parties to this proposal?
- 4) Don't forget to consider the process of ethical decision-making



# Process of Ethical Decision-Making

1. Stop and think to determine the facts
2. Identify options
3. Consider consequences for yourself and others
4. Make an ethical choice and take appropriate action



# Process of Ethical Decision-Making

## 1. Determine the facts

- The movie is “R” rated
- The student is underage
- The movie is award winning



# Process of Ethical Decision-Making

## 2. Identify options

- Stay the course
- Hold student accountable for final exam
- Assign the student another age-appropriate film to watch
- Eliminate this element from the student's final grade



# Process of Ethical Decision-Making

3. Consider consequences for yourself and others
  - Demonstrate that you value the diversity in the classroom
  - Use a consistent evaluation/assessment instrument
  - No pressure should be placed on the student for being underage
  - Student should have notified instructor immediately regarding reason for leaving the class



# Process of Ethical Decision-Making

## 4. Make an ethical choice

- Assign the student another film to review



- **Selrico** - Provided grab & go services up through July 23rd, 2015
- **Lancer Hospitality – August 2015**
  - Contractor provided hot food options, grab & go availability and varieties of beverages
  - SWC deliverable collapsed with Lancer 12/9/2016 due to substantial losses - \$72,000
- **Mcliff MiMart Kiosk** - Installed January 2017
  - Since inception, average monthly sales of \$4,600 and shrinkage ranging from 6% - 37% (MiMart business model allows for 4% shrinkage rate)
  - **Chef Don**
    - Initiated service April 9th, 2018 providing hot breakfast, lunch and dinner options
    - 4 week performance: \$680/avg daily sales at a \$2,693 loss
  - Mcliff removed MiMart concept August 3rd but vending machines remain
- **Current Service Strategy by Chef Jerry**
  - On site services are currently being defined by Contract Administration
