ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- St. Philip's College has been ranked among the top 10 Most Affordable Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU) by Student Loan Hero. SPC ranks nine among all institutions and number one in Texas for affordability.
- Tourism, Hospitality, & Culinary Arts received a \$10,000 donation from the Cowboy Breakfast Foundation to support student scholarships.
- St. Philip's College was named #4 on the Best Historically Black Colleges & Universities in Texas 2022 list by University Headquarters. SPC, the top two-year institution ranked on the state list, is the nation's only college federally designated as both an HBCU and Hispanic-Serving Institution (HSI).
- During Academic Year 2021-2022, SPC raised over \$1 million in scholarships and \$7.3 million in grants.




Five Year Enrollment Trends





Insider Information in Student Government

“Drake is the Finance Commissioner on his university’s Associated Students organization. He supervises the funding process, which allocates thousands of dollars to student clubs and societies each term. In order to receive funding, clubs and societies must fill out funding proposals, which detail past spending, proposed budgets and possible revenue streams.

One of Drake’s close friends, Alex, is crafting a funding proposal for his club and asks Drake to meet and review the proposal before he submits it. Drake directs Alex to the online resources and tip guides Associated Students provides to help guide student organizations through the funding process, but Alex values Drake’s expertise in the area and wants personal guidance for his club’s proposal.

QUALITY ENHANCEMENT PLAN (QEP): **ETHICAL DECISION-MAKING**



Drake loves the club's idea. It is a proposal the school has been talking about for years, and someone has finally decided to attempt to implement it. Drake knows students would love the event and would really benefit from the opportunity to attend the program, but wonders if it is fair to provide assistance. If Drake meets with Alex, he will be able to provide specific advise that will ensure Alex's proposal is approved, and that seems unfair to other student groups. Drake wishes he could offer personalized guidance to every student organization, but far too many proposals are submitted each quarter to meet with each group individually. If Drake choose not to review the funding request, he knows Alex will be upset. After all, Alex has already put in the work to craft the full proposal. He is only asking for some friendly advise on improving it. Drake is conflicted. He worries that in providing friendly advice, he will compromise his professional ethic."

QEP: ETHICAL DECISION-MAKING



Determine the facts:

1. The University has an established funding process
2. Drake serves as the Finance Commissioner
3. A Funding Proposal is required
4. Alex and Drake are close Friends
5. Alex has requested a pre-proposal review before submittal

QEP: ETHICAL DECISION-MAKING



Identify options:

- 1. Alex may continue to press Drake for his pre-proposal review**
- 2. Drake may advise Alex of the ethical nature of his request**
- 3. Alex prepares his proposal without the input from Drake**
- 4. This proposal may not be funded on its merits**
- 5. This proposal may be funded on its merits**

QEP: ETHICAL DECISION-MAKING



Consider consequences:

- 1. Drake's Integrity in the process will be forever tainted**
- 2. Drake may lose a close friend**
- 3. Drake's input may cause him to lose his position as the Finance Commissioner**
- 4. The pre-proposal review may throw the entire funding process into question**

QEP: ETHICAL DECISION-MAKING



The ethical choice and appropriate action:

- 1. Drake should not provide a pre-proposal review**
- 2. Drake should not allow Alex to compromise his position as Commissioner**
- 3. Prepare a published statement encouraging all to focus on areas that carry the highest weight in the evaluation process**
- 4. Drake may cite areas that he should pay particular attention to in the proposal process**
- 5. Friendship should not be a factor**

 - Or, you can “Feed the Tiger” to submit positive, constructive feedback, or concerns about the services offered by St. Philip's College and its partnering vendors.


